LOCAL HISTORY

German Methodists in St. Louis

The following translation by the Special Collections Department staff is from "Jubiläumsbuch der St. Louis Deutschen Konferenz herausgegeben nach ihrer Anordnung zur Feier ihres fünfundzwanzigjährigen Bestands" [Anniversary Book of the St. Louis German Conference Published at Its Behest for the Celebration of Its 25 Years of Existence] by E.C. Margaret, Friedrich Mung, and Geo. B. Addicks (Cincinnati: Jennings and Graham, [1906], pp. 351–354, R 287.6 J91).

Eden Congregation, St. Louis, Mo.

Eden, or the Warren Street Congregation, as it is known in the conference minutes, is the third oldest of our St. Louis congregations, being organized on March 5, 1848 as the East St. Louis Mission. Although the number of members was small and the difficulties many, the congregation succeeded in building a modest frame church and parsonage on the east side of Broadway and dedicated it on to the worship of the Triune God on July 23, 1848. The cost was \$993.35. The minutes indicate that the small congregation's path was no bed of roses and was rough going. The congregation was especially hampered by the departure of some loyal members. Attendance at worship was scant and prayer meetings were for months attended by no more than three people.

Under the grace-filled work of Brother R. Havighorst, 1851 to 1853, things improved. Souls were won for the Lord and worship services more largely attended. The activity of preachers W. Fiegenbaum, Hermann Koch and Alois Löbenstein had a salutary influence, and the increased attendance at worship was such that it convinced the church council to commence construction of a new building. The church council approved the purchase of a new lot at the corner of 13th and Benton Streets on June 22, 1852. Unfortunately, the old church was consumed by fire at 3 p.m. on Aug. 7, which made it necessary to pursue new construction with urgency. The church was built under the leadership of Brother W. Fiegenbaum and dedicated to the worship of God by Brother Ph. Kuhl on June 25. The cost of construction was \$2928.50. During this time, the congregation held a blossoming parochial school with competent teachers, and many current distinguished mem-

bers received their first spiritual instruction in the German language there.

The trend of members to move west led the church council to purchase a lot at the corner of 19th and Warren for a new church, and the cornerstone was laid in autumn of that same year. The dedication was accomplished on Dec. 16, 1883 by Dr. H. Liebhart. The total outlay was \$20,000 including parsonage. Under Brother H. Naumann's administration, the church was thoroughly renovated in the summer of 1896. A tasteful tower with two bells was constructed and executed in a modern style at the cost of \$8500, so that the current church property represents a value of \$25,000. Dr. F. L. Nagler preached at the reopening on Aug. 25, 1895 on "The Influence of the Church on the Spiritual Development of the People." Currently the congregation counts 227 members, has a Sunday school, an Epworth League of 40 members, a Junior

League, and three active Ladies and Young Ladies Societies contributing in various ways towards the welfare of the congregation. In addition, a number of consecrated and successful men from the congregational roll have gone into the preaching office.

The following preachers have served the congregation over the years: Chas. Bauer, 1848 – 49; Chas. Hollmann, 1849 – 50; August Korfhage, 1850 – 51; Rudolph Havighorst, 1851 – 53; Wilhelm Fiegenbaum, 1853 – 54; Hermann A Koch, 1854 – 55; Alois Löbenstein, 1855 – 57; Gustav Zollmann, 1857 – 58; John Keck, 1858 – 59; Christoph Höch, 1859 – 60; John Kölle, 1860 – 62; John Ritter, 1862 – 64; Hy. Naumann, 1864 – 67; A. F. Korfhage, 1867 – 69; Heinrich Ellerbeck, 1869 – 72; Heinrich Schutz, 1872 – 75; Georg Bühner, 1875 – 78; Heinrich Lahrmann, 1878 – 1881; Chas. Rodenberg, 1881 – 84; Chas. Holtkamp, 1884 – 1887; David Hüne, 1887 – 90; Heinrich Noß, 1890 – 92; Hy. Naumann, 1892 – 95; G. C. Magaret, 1895 – 1900; and since then, the current preacher, David S. Wahl.

The board of directors [Vorstand] of the congregation consists of the following members: local preachers [Lokalprediger], H. Meyer, K. Franz, H. W. Becker and G. F. Schewe. Stewards [Verwalter]: H. W. Becker, G. C. Samuel, D. G. Dunker, J. H. Schagemann, W. G. Rosengarten, F. W. Klein, Albert Kleinschmidt, Geo. P. Becker, and Geo. F. Kleinschmidt. Trustees: C. F. Wennecker, C. F. Niedringhaus, C. G. Hülsick, Theo. W. Niedringhaus, Samuel Kleinschmidt, Dr. K. Franz, Dr. H. W. Kriege, Hy. Bus, Louis Kleinschmidt, E. F. Schilling, David Metz, and Chas. Maoll. The Superintendent of the Sunday school is J. H. Schagemann; president of the Epworth League is Sister Ada Barkhöfer. The presidents of the Junior League are Sisters T. W. Niedringhaus and Esther Barkhöfer. The president of the Women's Society is Sister E. F. Schilling.

David S. Wahl, the congregation's current preacher, was born on Aug. 20, 1869 in Berea, Ohio. The family moved the following year to San Jose, Ill., where he grew into

boyhood and young manhood. In 1886 he was converted under the efforts of Brother R. Havighorst, and in the following years attended our high schools in Mt. Pleasant, Ia. and Warrenton, Mo., where he completed the classical courses. From April 1893 to September 1895 he served the congregation in Beardstown, Ill. Afterwards he attended the theological institute of our church in Evanston, Ill. for one year and then was sent as preacher of our congregation in Springfield, Ill., where he worked in blessing from 1896 to 1900. He is now the preacher-elect at the Warren Street Congregation, St. Louis, Mo.

DELVING INTO DEWEY

Literature, history, biography and geography

This month's issue features the final installment on finding St. Louis research resources scattered throughout Dewey call number ranges in the Special Collections Department.

800s: Literature

In May 1914, the city of St. Louis decided to hold a festival commemorating the 150th anniversary of its founding. The name Pageant and Masque of Saint Louis was chosen, the Pageant being a daytime celebration and the Masque, a civic drama held in the evening presenting the history of the city. More than 400,000 people attended the Masque's four nights of performance on a stage covering the lagoon at the foot of Art Hill in Forest Park. Read the *masque*, or *play*, as we would call it today, in "Saint Louis: A Civic Masque" (R 812 M153S).

In 1972, during a time of racial tension and the Vietnam War, a female member of ACTION, a militant civil rights group, knocked the hat and veil off the head of the Veiled Prophet at St. Louis' annual Veiled Prophet Society Ball, revealing his identity. The exclusive society for white, male Christians was under attack and the Veiled Prophet Ball would forever be changed. Thirty years following her introduction into St. Louis society, Lucy Ferriss, author of *Unveiling the Prophet: The Misadventures of a Reluctant*

Debutante (R 813.54 F394U) returns to her hometown to interview some of the key figures in both ACTION and the Veiled Prophet Society.

Was your ancestor a judge or lawyer in St. Louis or elsewhere in Missouri prior to 1884? Or did your ancestor appear before a judge or hire a lawyer before 1884? If so, you will want to take a look at the "Bench and Bar of St. Louis, Kansas City, Jefferson City, and other Missouri Cities: Biographical Sketches with Steel Engraved Portraits" (R 923.4778 B457). Despite the title, not all biographies contain portraits.

900s: History, geography and biography

If you have visited the Special Collections Department, you know that the majority of the collection is catalogued in the 900s. Of special note is the 929.1 call number where most genealogical research guides are located. "St. Louis Family History Research Guide" (R 929.1 F597S and circulating copy) by local author Ann Carter Fleming is a must-read for every St. Louis researcher. This book contains information about all St. Louis resources, the history behind them, where they are and how to use them.

Did you know that the brother of the director of the St. Louis Mercantile Library was none other than Joseph E. Johnston, the commanding general of the confederate army in Virginia? Edward W. Johnston, the library director, was forced to resign in 1862 when he refused to take an oath of loyalty to the Union. Read about this and many other interesting events that took place from 1861-1865 in the "Civil War in St. Louis: A Guided Tour" (R 973.7 W787C and Q 973.7 W787C). Beautiful lithographs, photographs and maps make for an engaging read on a difficult time in American history.

Are you looking for historic St. Louis maps? Special Collections has many, ranging from the early 19th century to today. Most are catalogued in 977.865 (St. Louis County) or 977.866 (St. Louis City), but "Pitzman's Atlas of the City and County of Saint Louis, Missouri" is at R 977.8 P692A and CD-ROM R 977.8 P692A. This atlas shows names of city and county property owners in 1878. Also be sure to check for various years of St. Louis City and

County street guides, such as Wunnenberg's at R 912.778 S145W.

We hope you have enjoyed this brief tour through the Dewey Decimal System, finding great St. Louis resources in unexpected places.

units could also join, and subsequently serve, as a unit. The term *Volunteers* was used to differentiate these men from full-time, Regular Army soldiers. The service of these volunteers is documented in these records.

The database records are an index to the Compiled Service Records (CSRs) created for volunteers who served in the Spanish-American War. While the CSRs themselves are not included in this database, the index cards provide name, rank and unit.

■ [Maryland, Marriages, 1634-1777](#) | A collection of details on early Maryland marriages extracted from church and other records as indexed in "Maryland Marriages" by Robert Barnes (available in the Special Collections Department at call no. 975.2 B261M). The book features a compilation of marriages, 1634 – 1777, in church and other records in the Maryland Historical Society in Baltimore or the Hall of Records in Annapolis. Marriages are arranged alphabetically by groom's last name, followed by the marriage date and name of the bride. Some records also provide fathers' names, previous spouses, or other details. The last column of the entry includes a code with a page number. These refer to the author's source for the marriage information. An explanation of the codes is included in the book's introductory material, which you'll find just before the list of marriages begins.
