## FOR THE RECORDS

## **Gatewood Gardens Cemetery**

Gatewood Gardens Cemetery (GG), as it is currently known, is an important one in the history of the St. Louis German-American community and one that researchers often encounter. It is also one that causes much confusion. The Special Collections Department has recently acquired GG records on 29 rolls of microfilm covering 1877 to 2001. The following information offers a brief clarification of the cemetery's history and an explanation of records available on microfilm.

## History\*

GG's story actually begins with an older, unrelated cemetery. When Holy Ghost German Evangelical Church, under the leadership of the Rev. Friedrich Picker, established Holy Ghost Cemetery in 1846 (see Figure 1, Property A and maps on page 2). This cemetery was located four miles northeast of the GG on Gravois Road on land now occupied by Roosevelt High School. Burials were performed as late as 1903, but community pressure caused the city to condemn it, and the property was sold for redevelopment in 1917.

In 1856, Picker and a group of members left Holy Ghost Church and established Independent German Evangelical Protestant Congregation (now Christ the King United Church of Christ in Florissant). That same year, the congregation established Independent German Evangelical Protestant Cemetery on 12-1/2 acres of land on the south side of Gravois Road near the River Des Peres (Property B). The

cemetery was expanded in 1881, when 28 acres were added on the north side of Gravois and expanded again in 1901 with 28 adjoining acres (both additions are represented as a unit by Property C). When Holy Ghost Cemetery closed in 1917, many graves were moved to GG.

Independent Evangelical Protestant Congregation sold the cemetery (Properties B and C) in 1978, and the new owners changed the name to St. Louis Memorial Gardens. The property declined as it went through a further change of ownership until the City of St. Louis seized it for back taxes in 1996. Since then, it has been CONTINUED ON PAGE 3

managed by the St. Louis Land Redevelopment Corporation, under the name Gatewood Gardens.

As this history illustrates, confusion occurs, because:

- 1. Frederick Picker was the pastor of the two congregations that founded Holy Ghost Cemetery (Property A) and GG (Property B and Property C).
- 2. As a result, the name "Picker" has been connected to all three properties either formally or informally.
- 3. When Holy Ghost was closed, GG was one of five cemeteries to receive bodies for reburial.

## Overview of the records

The records acquired by St. Louis County Library pertain specifically to the cemetery now known as Gatewood Gardens (Property B and Property C on the diagram). Records are included on 29 rolls of film (SLCEM 97 – SLCEM–124 in drawer 53). Records created before 1877 are not known to exist and are not included in the filming. The rolls

include a table of contents and title target sheets that help orient the user to the material.

## Background

The illustration on page 2, showing three pieces of cemetery property designated as Properties A, B, and C, will help to explain the background of this cemetery and its multiple names. The following chart shows phrases used to designate the two parts of GG:

## Searching the records

To find a burial, begin by searching online at the <u>Gatewood Gardens Cemetery website</u> <a href="http://tinyurl.com/azaxnlp">http://tinyurl.com/azaxnlp</a>. Researchers can search by name of the lot card holder, name of the buried person, comment, or burial year range. After selecting the type of search and entering the search term, it is important to click the search button beneath that particular dialog box to receive the correct search results (Figure 2, page 4). A successful search should return the date of burial, section, and lot number.

The search results screen will display up to four listings (Figure 3, page 4). If more matching records are found, a "View all records" hyperlink will appear next to the results. Click on the link to see the rest of the records, which may exceed 100 entries. A name with a hyperlink will offer additional information, such as others buried in the same lot. As an example of how "Search by comment" works, enter the term "pauper" and review the 194 results.

When the Land Reutilization Authority (LRA) acquired Gatewood Gardens Cemetery through tax foreclosure sale, it received incomplete records. According to the GG website, LRA estimates that the database represents 90% of the records and notes that the missing 10% are from Blocks II and IV in the old side of the cemetery (Property B). A note on the microfilm states that no records prior to 1877 were found for this cemetery.

Other sources for finding GG burials are "St. Louis Burials," Vol. 4 CD-ROM index (available on Special Collections Department public computers), "Old Cemeteries, St. Louis County, Missouri" (six print volumes, R 977.865 O44), family information, an obituary, the St. Louis Death Register, a death certificate, or probate records. While these sources do not provide the cemetery section/block and lot number, the date of death and/or cemetery of burial are good clues when searching for a common name.

## The records in detail

The microfilm set includes seven types of records that, when used collectively, provide researchers with different perspectives.

Cemetery Information and History (appears near the beginning of each roll) | A one-page history provides a brief overview of the cemetery, although it does not completely agree with what others have written. It discusses Holy Ghost Cemetery, New Picker's Cemetery, Memorial Gardens, and Gatewood Gardens through the transition when GG was seized by the City of St. Louis for more than \$200,000 in back taxes.




Figure 4 | A typical Gatewood Gardens Cemetery lot card

Lot Cards (rolls SLCEM-97 – SLCEM-118) | This series comprises more than half of the 29 rolls and includes lot owner cards. Each card lists the name and residence of the lot owner, a numbered list of the individuals buried in that lot with each person's name, age, and date of death, and a lot diagram showing the location and approximate size of each casket (figure 4, page 5).

The cards are first divided into Sections A-Q (new side, north of Gravois or Property C) and Blocks I-VI (old side, south of Gravois or Property B) and then arranged in alphabetical order by lot owners' names. Consult the chart (figure 6, page 6) to determine which film roll(s) to consider. Film box labels provide more detailed information to help pinpoint a specific roll.

Log Books (SLCEM-119 – SLCEM-122) | Six volumes list burials in chronological order for Aug. 11, 1877 through 2001. The information includes burial date, deceased person's name, age, place of birth, place and cause of death, and the name and address of the attending physician. Records from the early years are faint and best viewed on the Special Collections Department's new ViewScan microfilm readers (researchers should consult a staff member before using this equipment).

**Lot map books** (SLCEM-122 – SLCEM-123) | Discovering who occupies a burial lot is a way of connecting individuals to each other. Knowing who occupied neighboring lots is also important. Beside the list of lot burials appears a

diagram showing the location of each person's casket within the lot. Lot maps are organized by section, and then by lot number (Figure 5). Sometimes, a section listing begins with a diagram of the entire section showing the number and shows the location of each lot within the overall section. Such diagrams exist for sections A, B, C, G, H, and I (not to be confused with the Roman numeral). A map of GG is also located in the "Cemetery Maps" binder on the finding aids table in the Special Collections Department.

Lot Owner Books (SLCEM-123 – SLCEM-124) | The six books in this set provide an alphabetical index of lot owners for the "New Side of Gatewood Gardens Cemetery" (Property C) and includes (according to film notes at the beginning of each book) occasional information for the "Old Side of the Cemetery" (Property B). Although these pre-printed ledgers have two columns meant only for brief entries, the record keeper wrote the lot owner's information across both columns and added extra information. The result shows each lot owner's last name, first name, lot number, section, and address.

Lot owners for single graves appear in grid showing the layout of the graves. Each grid, one page in size, shows the graves by rows with each row subdivided into individual graves. Each rectangle representing a grave shows the grave number, name, and date.

Burial Listing Books (SLCEM-124) | Includes burial list-


ings of single graves for the "New Side of Gatewood Gardens" (Property C), 1916–1985, arranged in numerical order by grave number. Entries list the grave number, name of deceased, age, and burial date. Film notes at the beginning of these books state that grave numbers 1–487, 489, 1324–2000, and 2013–2048 are missing, as well as the "Personal Graves New Side Baby Row."

Cemetery Deed Book (SLCEM-124) | The cemetery deed book applies only to the "New Side of Gatewood Gardens" (Property C). Records are arranged by section (A, B, C, etc.) and then numerically by lot number. Entries record the size of lot, lot purchaser, deed number, and if it was transferred.

## Case study using GG records

Frank Volek died Sept. 10, 1933 and was buried on Sept. 12 in New Pickers Cemetery (later known as Gatewood Gardens, north of Gravois or Property C). An online search "by Buried Person" in the Gatewood Gardens database listed the burial in Section D, Lot 269. An added the note, "(Rem. To St. P & P. 11/21/38)," indicated a removal five years later to Saints Peter and Paul Cemetery.

Searching the GG microfilms provides more information. Frank's burial appeared in the Cemetery Interment Log Book (SLCEM-120) and the notation "2265 Indiana" followed his name. His record further showed him as 53 years

of age, lists W. C. Moydell as undertaker, and included the comment "Removed T. St. Peter & Paul 11/22/1938."

The Cemetery Lot Books (SLCEM-122) included a map for section D, lot 269. It showed the name Georg H. Simon (marked out) at the top of that lot as cemetery lot owner with the name "Zof" without a first name written right above it. The numbered list for that lot noted only one burial, that of Frank Volek, on Sept. 12, 1933, and included the information about his removal to "St. P & Paul" just below the entry.

If someone named Zof owned Frank Volek's lot, then including the name Zof in this cemetery search might reveal a possible connection. Lot Cards (SLCEM-99) revealed a Frank Zof as owner of lot 269 in Section D, but the card included neither names of people buried in the lot nor coffin images in the drawn diagram. The card added a new piece of information, however. "Mrs. Zuzick 1906 S. 12<sup>th</sup>" and "63104" appeared where the lot owner's address should have been written.

One of the Lot Owner Books (SLCEM-123) showed Zuzilk (no first name) as the owner of lot 269 in lot D and showed "1906 S/12<sup>th</sup>" as the mailing address. The last book in the set (SLCEM-124) indexes the owners by first letter of the last name. Checking the Zs showed no listing for Zuzilk/Zurick, but did list Frank Zof as owner of lot 269 in Section D. The notation to the right read "removed to 503 H 3845 Wyoming," which raises more questions. On the same page

appears a V. Zoff as owner of lot 90 block I (old section south of Gravois) with an address of 2643 Nebraska. Perhaps "503 H" indicates another location within this cemetery and 3845 Wyoming as the residence.

The Cemetery Deed Book (SLCEM-124) showed that deed 907 recorded the sale of lot 269, section D, for \$25 on 15 Oct 1904 to George H. Simon (the name marked out on the cemetery lot map). The lot was ten foot by ten foot in size. An added "transfer" notation states "New Deed to J? Zof. 9/7/1918."

Researching the records revealed that the names of Frank Zof, George H. Simon, and Mrs. Zurick/Zuzilk and the addresses of 2265 Indiana, 1906 S. 12<sup>th</sup> and 3845 Wyoming are all connected to the cemetery plot. Further research might reveal how or if Frank Volek, the person buried in the plot, is connected to these people and addresses.

## **Related Sources**

New Pickers Cemetery: Report of Internment (SLCEM-96) | A report covering the years 1877–1906 listing in chronological order the names of the deceased, age, sex, place of nativity, date of death, place of death, name of disease, name of physician, and residence of physician. While the information from the Missouri State Archives for this film lists it as New Pickers Cemetery, the filmed book itself is the same volume as volume 1 of the Gatewood Gardens Cemetery Log Books (SLCEM–119). The early years in this book are challenging to read, so checking a duplicate might help.

## Holy Ghost Cemetery Records (EVUC-18 - EVUC-20 |

As mentioned above, Holy Ghost Cemetery (1847–1907) was a separate and initially unrelated cemetery located about four miles northeast of GG (see Figure 1, Property A) but is often confused with GG and vice versa. If searching one cemetery in the 1847 – 1907 time period produces no results, the other cemetery should also be checked.

## New at Ancestry Library Edition

## ■ United Kingdom Civil Divorce Records, 1858–1911 |

The 1857 Matrimonial Causes Act removed divorce from ecclesiastical jurisdiction and made it a civil act. Records include papers arising from petitions for divorce, judicial separation, declarations of legitimacy, applications for protection of a wife's earnings, etc., in the Court for Divorce and Matrimonial Causes and Probate, Divorce and Admiralty Division of the High Court of Justice. In most cases the files have been weeded and contain only minutes, pleadings and decrees, but the papers in selected suits illustrating particular kinds of proceedings have been preserved in their entirety. Records contained in each file will vary, but a file may provide name, gender, spouse, spouse's gender, type of record, petition year, date and place of marriage, names and birth details of children and copy of marriage certificate. Records will indicate who filed the petition and who the respondent was. They may also provide a short history of the marriage (including addresses), the grounds for the divorce petition with some details (such



as names, times, and places associated with adultery or desertion), terms of judgment, and other details, which can make these records both informative and very personal.

## ■ U.S., Deaths in the U.S. Naval Service, 1861–1867 |

President Abraham Lincoln ordered a naval blockade of Southern ports only days after the start of hostilities at Fort Sumter, and the Union navy would play a vital role in the war at sea and on the country's rivers. The ledger book featured in this database contains a list of U.S. Navy personnel who served and died during the Civil War. While this ledger is not a comprehensive list of U.S. Navy fatalities, the name, place and date of death, rank, vessel, disease or injury and remarks are given for the names included.

■ UK, Outward Passenger Lists, 1890–1960 | Includes lists recording the names of people leaving from UK ports for destinations outside of Europe. While outbound passenger lists before 1890 have not survived, this collection still covers decades of peak emigration. It includes not only British citizens but also others who traveled through the UK on their way to other destinations. Information can include name, age at departure, gender, profession, last ad-

dress in the UK, last country of permanent residence, country of intended permanent residence, port of departure, country of departure, date of departure, port of destination, country of destination, ship name, shipping line, and ship master's name.

- Naturalization records | A number of naturalization record indexes have recently been added to Ancestry Library Edition. Information in these indexes include given and surname of individuals, naturalization date, birth date or age, nationality, and a reference to the location of the original record, including volume number, page number and record number. Other information found on the cards, but not indexed includes occupation, present address, and names, occupations, and addresses of witnesses. Naturalization records have been added for the following states:

the date of establishment and discontinuance of post offices, changes of names of post offices, and names and appointment dates for their postmasters. The database also includes dates of Presidential appointments of postmasters and their confirmation dates by the Senate. Starting in 1870, the records contain names of post offices where discontinued post office's mail was sent. Up to 1930, the records are arranged by location and then alphabetically by name of post office. After 1930, there are two types of records. They are arranged alphabetically by name of post office and alphabetically by the appointment's name. Records include name, appointment date, vacancy cause, vacancy date, post office location, state, county and volume.

## ■ Citizenship Case Files in Indian Territory,

1896–1897 | Includes case files from the U.S. Court in Indian Territory regarding applicants seeking enrollment in the Cherokee and Creek tribes for the years 1896–1897. Congress authorized the Dawes Commission in 1893 to negotiate land allotments among members of the Five Civilized Tribes (Cherokee, Choctaw, Chickasaw, Creek, Seminole). These allotments assigned portions of previously held tribal land to individuals. To do this, the commission first had to determine who qualified to be enrolled as a citizen of a tribe. Documents in this database come from appeals made relating to the enrollment process. They include "briefs, memorandums, exhibits, applications, clippings, correspondence, decisions, histories, letters, opinions, order, proceedings, rolls, and telegrams pertaining to appeals for requests for enrollment as Cherokees and Creeks under the act of 1896. These cases were heard by the U.S. Court in Indian Territory Northern District at Muskogee."

Some case files are very detailed, while others are quite brief. The files can include important names, dates, and family relationships, as plaintiffs explain or establish their connection with the tribe. Because these records are case files, a browse or search will access the first page of the file. Use the arrow keys to navigate through all the documents related to the case.

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
