### Guide to St. Louis Catholic Archdiocesan Parish Records now online


Originally published by the St. Louis County Library Foundation in 2001, *Guide to St. Louis Catholic Archdiocesan Parish Records* by Christine Human Hughes is [now available as a PDF from the St. Louis County Library website](#). <<http://tinyurl.com/pnhwpxs>>. The online version has been updated to reflect parish closings since 2001. The original can still be viewed in History & Genealogy at St. Louis County Library Headquarters.

The guide provides a list of records held on microfilm in History & Genealogy. Listings include date ranges of records for each parish, the St. Louis County Library microfilm roll number, and the corresponding Family History Library film number. The PDF also includes historical information, lists of parishes by date of founding, references to print sources, and availability of parish jubilee histories.

The Archdiocese of St. Louis includes churches in Franklin, Jefferson, Lincoln, Perry, St. Charles, St. Francois, St. Louis, Ste. Genevieve, Warren, and Washington counties, and the Independent City of St. Louis.



# FOR THE RECORDS

## The John Dabney Shane Manuscript Collection

*Dinner at 6½ o'clock. A piece of Turkey, potatoes, turnips, a piece of beef, parmesan cheese, drink water. – [John Dabney Shane Manuscripts, D542-Diary of an Unknown Writer, Reel 6]*

For readers in St. Louis, it seems odd to refer to Kentucky and Ohio as the West. But for the early settlers of the American Republic, these were indeed frontier areas.

John Dabney Shane was born in Cincinnati in 1812. He studied theology in Virginia, and returned to the Ohio Valley as a Presbyterian minister. In his spare time, he devoted

himself to the study of history. Of particular interest were the disappearing pioneer societies in Kentucky and Ohio. Adopting some of the same methodologies implemented by fellow historian Lyman Copeland Draper, Shane conducted interviews, collected and transcribed documents, and clipped newspapers. Where Draper tended to focus his research on famous individuals and military exploits, Shane's interests were socio-cultural. Shane explored business, religion, education, and many aspects of life on the frontier.

When Shane died in 1864, his heirs sold his manuscripts. Draper purchased them and incorporated many of them into his own volumes. These are now in Series CC [The Kentucky Papers] of the Draper Manuscript Collection. They can be found in volumes 11-19, 26-30, and 36-37. Descriptions of these can be found in *Guide to the Draper Manuscripts*<sup>1</sup>. Additional information is available in *Calendar of the Kentucky Papers of the Draper Collection of Manuscripts*.<sup>2</sup>

Draper donated the portion of the Shane Manuscripts he did not want to the Presbyterian Historical Society in Philadelphia.<sup>3</sup> These became known as the Shane Manuscript Collection. The Historical Society sorted the manuscripts into groups by subject matter and the Family History Library filmed the records. They are available on thirty-two rolls of microfilm. History & Genealogy at St. Louis County Library has acquired copies of all thirty-two films.

The Shane Manuscripts consist primarily of letters, but include records from frontier churches, families, and individuals. Much of the collection consists of sermons and discussions of theological material. It also contains many sources of genealogical information, which in many cases cannot be found in any other resource.

### Examples from the Record

The Shane Manuscripts contain a number of interesting records that could be of great benefit to your research. The following are examples of the type of information you are likely to find within the collection.

Established in 1795, the First Presbyterian Church in Flemingsburg, Kentucky, is among the oldest congregations


west of the Appalachian Mountains. Shane obtained a register of communicant members listing more than 400 individuals. In many cases it includes their birthdates (from the 1700s) and on some records names of their spouses or parents. Often recorded is a date of death or information about their migration away. Genealogists recognize that this type of information from early American history is very difficult to obtain. Figure 1 shows the first page of the record.

Early Kentucky marriage records can be difficult to obtain. While Ancestry has an index covering 1802 to 1850, and FamilySearch covering 1785 to 1979, neither contains actual images of marriage licenses. The Robert Marshall Marriage Licenses in the Shane Collection include more than 100 early Kentucky marriage licenses from Scott, Bourbon,

Fayette, and Woodford counties. Most of these cannot be found in any other resource. The William Appleton and Elizabeth Lemon Marriage License (Figure 2) is an example of one of these licenses.

The Shane Manuscripts include records of interment in the Cemetery of the First Presbyterian Church in Cincinnati. These can be very useful for documenting death, especially in the era before other forms of death records. Figure 3 shows the record of interment for Samuel Patterson.

Baptist records are particularly difficult to find. Included in the Shane Manuscripts on reel 28 is the "Manuscript Collection of Church Records, Letters, Diaries, and other Papers Related to Kentucky, Illinois, and Ohio." It includes membership lists of various churches as well as minutes

and other records. An example is Figure 4 showing a page from the lists of members at Clear Creek, Fayette County, Kentucky.

These are only examples and barely scratch the surface of the information available in the Shane Collection.

### Using the records

Unfortunately, an every-name index to the Shane Manuscripts does not exist. With a simple understanding of how the records are arranged, however, it is definitely possible to find information in the collection.

At the time of filming, the Presbyterian Historical Society had sorted the documents of the Shane Collection into 158 sections of related items. The section headings are such things as the “Cabin Creek, West Union and Eagle Creek Papers,” the “H. T. Duncan Papers,” and the “William Williamson Papers.” These describe the general subject matter contained within each section.

The sections are found in alphabetical order and within each section is one or more file folder containing about ten items. The title for each item is listed on the front of file folder. The folder front appears on the film before the contents. Occasionally, the items are out of date order, and in a few cases the records were filmed out of numerical sequence.


Included on the films are some finding aids created by the Historical Society<sup>4</sup>. These finding aids demonstrate no known correlation with the John Dabney Shane microfilm. Due to this inconsistency, we do not recommend their use.

Recommended is William K. Hall’s *The Shane Manuscript Collection: A Genealogical Guide to the Kentucky and Ohio Papers*<sup>5</sup>. The book contains a few minor errors, but it is an invaluable resource for anyone using the Shane Manuscripts. The book describes in detail the major sections of the manuscripts, providing roll by roll background information on the key figures mentioned in the manuscripts.

To further assist a researcher, the History and Genealogy staff has created an [online finding aid](http://tinyurl.com/ohcjau6) <<http://tinyurl.com/ohcjau6>> for the collection listing the title of each document with date of creation and section and item number. It also lists History and Genealogy roll numbers and the corresponding Family History Library film numbers. Items are listed in the order they appear on the film.

### Researching the manuscripts

So how exactly should you go about researching in the Shane Manuscripts?



**Step 1** | The first step is to search the [online finding aid](http://tinyurl.com/ohcjau6) <<http://tinyurl.com/ohcjau6>>. Use the browser's search function [Ctrl+F] to search for a name (of a person, place, church, etc.). If the name is in one of the document titles you should be able to find it.

**Step 2** | If that doesn't work, look at the names of the various sections. Hall's book can help you determine if a further search in a particular section makes sense. For example, if your ancestors were in Fayette County, Kentucky, you might want to look in records from that region.

**Step 3** | Use the finding aid and the Hall book to choose potential records to view.

The John Dabney Shane Collection, like most manuscript collections, can be a challenging resource to use, but a diligent researcher can discover treasures in it that make the effort worthwhile.

## LOCAL HISTORY

### Tornado of Sept. 1927

On Sept. 29, 1927, a devastating tornado ripped through St. Louis. The next day, the Post-Dispatch headline read, "86 Killed, 500 Hurt in Tornado; \$10,000,000 Loss; Six Square Miles of Buildings Laid in Ruins." Reports also included a list of the tornado's casualties, with their names, ages, addresses, occupations and places of death.

Items in the local history file in History & Genealogy include a set of 14 donated photos of the aftermath of the

1927 tornado. The pictures depict buildings reduced to rubble and homes missing their facades. The photos belonged to a library patron's aunt who was a life-long St. Louis resident. A report in the file by members of the Engineers' Club of St. Louis and the St. Louis Chapter of the American Institute of Architects dated September 1928 offers recommendations on how to repair damaged buildings and implies that those made after the 1896 tornado were ignored. Other items in the file include newspaper articles, such as the one previously mentioned.

Materials in the local history file are available for viewing and research on Tier 5. Ask a librarian for assistance.



### Guide to Hanover Military Records, 1514-1866, on Microfilm at the Family History Library

Military records for the former Kingdom of Hanover are detailed sources covering the years 1514–1866. The original records are held in German archives, but microfilmed images are available to researchers through the Family History Library (FHL) Family History Centers and other affiliates world wide. Hanover's military records are untapped by researchers. Until now, English-language finding aids have been non-existent. Existing guides contained no cross-reference to the

FHL microfilm numbers. This book, created specifically for users of the FHL collection, fills that void.

The records span 130 rolls of FHL microfilm. Muster rolls may include the date and place of a soldier's birth, a physical description, or a father's name. Transfers to and from other companies provide clues to additional muster rolls to review. Other types of records in this collection include regimental journals; pension data (including widow's pleas for pensions); marriage consents; field church books; horse muster rolls, including physical descriptions of the horses and the names of the soldiers who rode them; and much, much more. Research involving a Hanover ancestor is not complete without considering this collection.

This new guide is a translation of major portions of the original German finding aid. In addition, the author added the FHL microfilm number for each record identified. Several new chapters include an overview of the history of the Kingdom of Hanover and details on how to use the guide, demonstrated by following the military career of one soldier.—*Adapted from author's website*



### A History of Czech Lands

Born January 1, 1993 after it split with Slovakia, the Czech Republic is one of the youngest members of the European Union. Despite its youth as a nation, this land and the areas just outside its modern borders boasts an ancient and intricate past.
