MICROFILM GEMS

George Rogers Clark papers

The George Rogers Clark Papers microfilm set offers a unique group of Revolutionary War documents. The Society of Colonial Wars, Illinois Sons of the Revolution, and the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution funded microfilming of ". . . the George Rogers Clark collection of papers pertaining to the Illinois Regiment of Virginia State Forces, person or matters relating to the Illinois Regiment," covering January 1778 through 5 November 1834. The papers are included on 13 rolls located film shelves 48–49 in the Special Collections Department.

The Library of Virginia holds the original documents, which include about 85,000 vouchers and receipts concerning George Rogers Clark's military activity during and after the Revolutionary War. The records pertain to both military personnel and civilians who provided goods or services. The records refer to the Old Northwest in general and mention a significant number of Illinois and Kentucky people and places.

Index

"Index to the George Rogers Clark Papers," an online index posted on the Sons of the Revolution in the State of Illinois website http://sril.gradeless.com/clark.htm, enables researchers to use this microfilm set effectively and easily. Detailed instructions explain how to interpret the index references, and the index itself follows. The instructions use the example of the listing for "Casey, Benjamin 1-20." The digit "1" before the dash ("-") represents the microfilm number; the number following the dash, "20," provides the first frame number for that document. The frame number is unique and appears at the top edge of the film (see image on page 2).

By going to roll one, frame 20, one can examine the two-page document that lists "Benj Casey" receiving payment for forage for one horse for 129 days. Frame 20 shows the first page of the document; frame 21 shows the second page.

Abstracts

Also available on the index website are links for each microfilm number. Each film number link leads to detailed abstract listings for the documents for the specified roll. As with the index, detailed instructions are provided to interpret the coding for the abstracts. Arranged in the order the documents appear on the film, these abstracts allow one to sift through the index listings and prioritize the ones of highest potential interest.


Search

SCHLUETER from St. Louis; the prize for best score in practical chemistry went to Joseph P. CONKLIN from Santa Fe, New Mexico, given by the professor of chemistry.

In the Junior class, Henry J. BASS from Abilene, Texas, achieved the best score in exams for all subjects. He received the prize given by the institution: tickets to all lectures in the senior year and the alumni prize: a standard text on the subject of pharmacy.

credit card or other payment information is collected). Although the images are also free on the 1940 Census official website https://the1940census.com, the web interface provided by Ancestry is much easier to use. The census images are also available on Ancestry Library Edition, which can be used at any St. Louis County Library branch and in the Special Collections Department.

Archives.com has entered into a partnership with the Archives of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) http://www.elca.org/Who-We-Are/History/ELCA-Archives.aspx to digitize and index 1,000 reels of microfilmed parish records, according to an April 17 news release. The records were created by Lutheran congregations across the U.S. and between 1793 and 1940. Archives.com estimates the records will be available online

■ <u>DeKalb County</u>, <u>Illinois vital records</u> http://www.dekalbgenealogy.com/: DeKalb County has placed birth records 75 years old and older, marriage records 50 years old and older, death records 20 years old and older, and naturalization records 100 years old and older online in a free searchable databases. Access requires setting up a free account on the website.

New on Ancestry Library Edition

- Michigan Death Records, 1897-1920: The index includes given name, family name, death date, place of death and attending physician.
- U.S. Enumeration District Maps and Descriptions for the 1940: The 1940 census was split into enumeration districts—geographic areas designed to allow a census taker (enumerator) to visit every house in the district within a two-week period (in rural areas, the time allowed was one month). Enumeration district maps illustrate these districts' boundaries. Included in this collection are descriptions of the district boundaries. Maps and descriptions can be particularly helpful when using a version of the 1940 census that has not been indexed (not searchable by a person's name). These maps and descriptions are meant to be used in conjunction with the 1940 United States Federal Census. Street names can be searched in the keyword field if the street name is included in the ED description.

Databases pertaining to the Titanic

The RMS *Titanic* sailed from Southampton, England, on 10 April 1912, bound for New York. The ship took on additional passengers at Cherbourg, France, and Queenstown, Ireland, and set off into the Atlantic with approximately 2,228 passengers and crew on board. The ship struck an iceberg shortly before midnight on 14 April in the North Atlantic about 400 miles south of Grand Banks of Newfoundland. *Titanic* sank in a matter of hours with a loss of about 1,517 passengers and crew. Ancestry has posted several databases related to this disaster:

■ UK, RMS Titanic, Deaths at Sea, 1912: This collection contains registers listing the names of passengers and crew who died during the sinking (CONTINUED ON PAGE 13)

Pauper Limerick: The Register of the Limerick House of Industry, 1774-1793

David Fleming and John Logan, editors; Dublin: Irish Manuscripts Commission, 2011; 109 pages; call no. R 941.945 P333

Of the twelve houses of industry established under the Irish poor law of 1771-2, this is the only admission book known to have survived. The register of the Limerick House of Industry contains information on the age, sex, place of origin, religion, medical condition, admission and discharge, amongst other details, of 2,747 inmates for the period 1774-1793. While revealing the mechanisms employed to administer a significant institution, the register also provides a singular record for a social group whose history is necessarily elusive. There is evidence of individual strategies for dealing with poverty, infirmity, disease and lunacy. Genealogists researching families in Limerick, Clare, Tipperary and Cork (the places in which most of the inmates originated) will also find it useful as will those historians interested in the history of those counties. The passenger registers list name, number, and port of registry of the ship; date of death; place of death; name, sex and age of the deceased; rank, profession, or occupation; nationality or birthplace; last place of abode; and cause of death. The crew registers list name; age, rank or rating; nationality or birthplace; last place of abode, ship name, number, port of register, tonnage; date, place, and cause of death; and remarks.

■ UK, RMS Titanic, Outward Passenger List, 1912: This database includes passenger lists for passengers who boarded the RMS *Titanic* at the ports of Southampton, England, and Queenstown, Ireland. It does not include lists for passengers who boarded the ship in France. The passenger lists recorded contract ticket number, name, class, port at which passenger contracted to land, age, gender, whether accompanied by spouse, country of last permanent residence, and country of intended future residence.

■ UK, RMS Titanic, Crew Records, 1912: The bulk of these records list crew members on the *Titanic*, both those who died at sea and those who survived. The database also includes an official list of deceased passengers. Data may include name, signature, age, nativity / nationality, addresses, date and place agreement signed, duties/position,

date and hour to be on board, wages, whether in Reserves, particulars of leaving the ship (for men who didn't show up, were sick, discharged, etc.), port of engagement address, rating, and gender. On passenger records you may find name, class, port of embarkation, and whether missing or saved.

- Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada, RMS Titanic Graves, 1912: Includes images of headstones marking the graves in Fairview Cemetery for victims of the *Titanic* sinking.
- Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada, RMS Titanic Fatality Reports, 1912 This database contains an index of bodies recovered after the sinking of the *Titanic* in 1912. Immediately after the *Titanic* disaster, the White Star Line chartered ships to search for and retrieve the bodies at the site of the disaster. Data was extracted from fatality reports created for 328 individuals whose bodies were recovered from the disaster site. These records were used to help identify each individual and ensure that next-of-kin were contacted and the body and effects delivered to them. Data can include the following details: name, status, gender, age, coroner identification number, physical appearance, clothing, and effects.
