St. Louis guardianship case files

Are you researching someone who was orphaned or declared incompetent as an adult? If so, finding his or her guardianship case files is bound to reveal many details. Whether the case involves a youth or an adult, records can span many years—until a child reached legal majority, until an adult was declared competent, or upon death. In any situation, case files include significant family information and provide a glimpse of a person’s life through the financial decisions and expenditures made on his or her behalf.

The Special Collections Department recently acquired almost 200 years of St. Louis Probate Court Guardianship Case Files on microfilm. The records are divided into three sets:

- “St. Louis (City) Missouri Guardianship Case Files, 1802–1875” (GUAR 1–202, microfilm drawers 39–42), includes both City and County records.
- “St. Louis (City) Missouri Guardianship Case Files, 1876–1901” (GUAR 203–516, microfilm drawers 42–45), covers only the City from 1876.
- “St. Louis County, Missouri Probate Court, Guardianship Case Files, 1877–1983” (GUCO 1–195, microfilm drawers 36–37), covers only the County after 1876.

The 1876 St. Louis City / County split affected the arrangement of the records. The box on page 4 provides a guide for finding the appropriate microfilm reels.

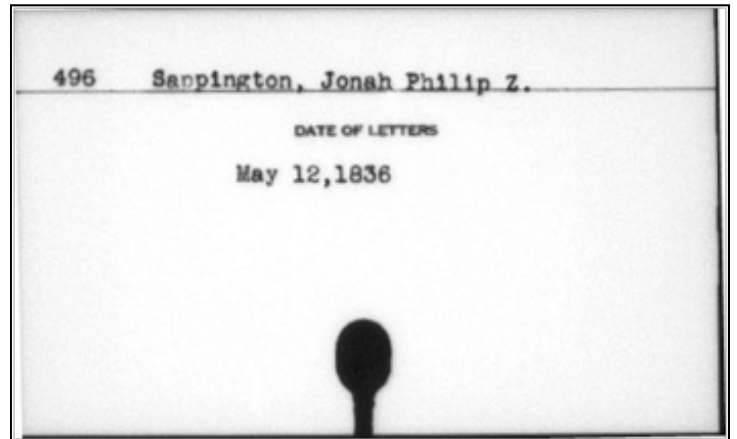


Figure 1 | Index card for St. Louis County and City Guardianship Case Files before 1876

The scope of the records goes beyond *guardianship* cases in which the Probate Court gave an adult (the guardian) responsibility over a minor (the ward). Interfiled also are *conservatorship* case files in which the Probate Court gave an adult (the conservator) or organization responsibility for an incapable or incompetent adult (the conservatee). Adults eligible for being placed in the care of another could include lunatics, spendthrifts, and habitual drunkards.

Indexes

Selecting the correct index for the time period you are researching is vital.

■ County and City before the 1876 Split: 1802–1876

A single roll of microfilm, “*St. Louis (City), Missouri Guardianship Case Files, 1802–1889: Index*” (GUAR 1a, microfilm drawer 39), provides access to the guardianship case files for St. Louis County, including the City of

St. Louis from 1802 through 1876. Cards are organized alphabetically by the name of the person for whom the guardianship exists. An index card (Figure 1, page 1) usually includes the ward's name (the person for whom the guardianship exists), the date, and (except in some very early cases) the case number. Be sure to record all the information.

■ **St. Louis County after the 1876 Split: 1877–1983**

The guardianship case files for St. Louis County after 1876 are in folders that have been filmed in alphabetical order by the name of the ward. Because of this, a supporting index is not required. In spite of that fact, a single roll of microfilm, “St. Louis County, Missouri, Probate Court, Index to Wards (Minors or Incompetent Individ.) 1879–1973” (COPW 1, microfilm drawer 36) indexes the records for most of those years (Figure 2, page 3). The film roll includes four index volumes. Vol. 1 (1879–1903) is in numerical order by case numbers. The indexes in Vols. 1A (1879–1909), 2 (1879–1960), and 3 (1960–1973) are arranged alphabetically by first letter of the wards' surnames.

■ **City after the 1876 Split: 1877–2006**

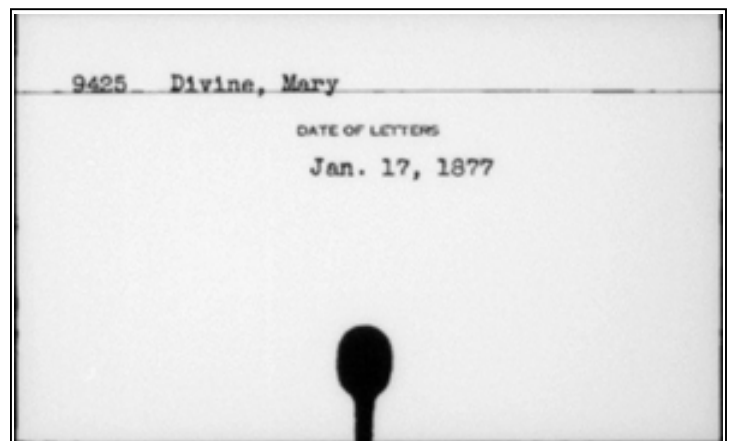


Figure 3: Example of Guardianship Case File index card for the City of St. Louis after 1876

Two indexes, “St. Louis (City), Missouri Guardianship Case Files, 1802–1889: Index” (GUAR 1a, microfilm drawer 39) and “St. Louis (City), Missouri Guardianship Case Files, 1890–2006: Index” (GUAR 1b – GUAR 1d, microfilm drawer 39) direct researchers to guardianship case files for the City of St. Louis after 1876 (Figure 3, page 4). Each filmed index card includes the name of the person for whom the guardianship exists, the case number, and the date. In appearance and information, they are identical to the index cards for the pre-1876 index and are organized alphabetically by the wards' names.

Accessing case files covering 1802–1837

Guardianship files dated 1802–1837 precede case file no. 554 on the microfilm. These early cases require an extra step to locate, because the files—and the index cards leading to them—do not consistently reflect either an alphabetical or chronological order.

For preservation purposes, the files were placed in numbered folders and then the folders were placed into numbered boxes. A container list at the beginning of each box acts like a table of contents in box and folder order. Case files prior to 554 can be found in Box 1 through part of Box 7. The Special Collections Department staff has indexed the container lists to provide easy access to these early files. The index is in a three-ring binder labeled “St. Louis, Mo. Guardianship Case Files” on the finding aids table across from the circulation desk. The “Guardianship by Name” tab leads to the index for case files through no. 553, which lists the correct box and folder. Make a note of the box and folder numbers. To find the desired film, compare the box and folder numbers to

the contents listed on the microfilm box labels, which provide that information for these early files.

Case file folders

Notations are written on folders for each case file. Understanding them will help orient you to the records.

County and City before the split; City after the split

File folders for county and city before the split, and city after the split include fairly extensive information. Figure 4 (page 5) shows the upper left hand corner of a file folder where the notations appear. In this case, “147 / 2” marks this as being the second folder in box 147; “9424” is the case file number, “Peter Divine” is the ward, and “1877” is the year it began. His guardian is Jephtha H. Simpson.

County after the split

County guardianship case file folders after the 1876 split are labeled with only the name and case file number (Figure 5, page 5). Because they are filed alphabetically by the name of the person for whom the guardianship was formed, additional information is not needed on the folder.

What a case file can reveal

Even a small file can provide a wealth of clues. For example, a file containing only two documents records that on Sept 10, 1954, Mary Smith petitioned St. Louis County Probate Court to be named as the “guardian of the person only” of Jane Doe, aged seventeen years, two months. Both Mary Smith and Jane Doe were residents of St. Louis County. The petition named Jane’s father and listed him as

Locating guardianship case files on microfilm for St. Louis City and St. Louis County

Guardianship case files are Probate Court records kept at the county level. In 1876, the City of St. Louis became independent of St. Louis County. All County records created up to then were retained by the City and kept at City Hall. Records created by the County after 1876 were kept at the County courthouse in Clayton. deceased. It also gave her mother's name, said she was still living, but further stated that her whereabouts was unknown. Mary Smith asked for guardianship so she could consent to the marriage of Jane, a minor, to Michael Jones. The petition further listed Jane Doe's exact date of birth and her current address, which matched the address of Mary Smith. However, nothing on the document indicated a relationship, kinship or otherwise, between the two women (note: names in this example were changed to protect the privacy of persons possibly still living).

Another case file that contained a single document is the case file of Julius Chenie, a minor (Figure 6, page 6). The document, dated June 17, 1842, lists Antoine Leo Chenie as principal and Joseph S. Pease as security. Their bond for \$25,000 provides a clue to the size of this young man's holdings. It further states that Julius Chenie, a minor, was twenty years, three months and twenty two days of age. That statement of age indicates he was within 9 months of his 21st birthday. Further, by subtracting his age from the document date, 17 June 1842, this suggests his birth date as Feb. 25, 1822.

While a guardianship might be brief for a ward nearing legal age, such as Julius Chenie, a guardianship for an infant could span many years. The guardianship case file number for Jonah Sappington was 496 and four index cards, showing the names of J.P.Z. Sappington, Jonah P.Z. Sappington, Jonah Philip Z. Sappington, and John P. Z.

Sappington lead to case 496. In the first document in his file, dated 12 May 1836, the court named Paris Pipkin as guardian for Jonah Philip Z. Sappington. That document listed Jonah as one year and one month old. The documents in his case file folder provide clues to his life, including educational information (he studied English, Latin, German, and Geometry) tax receipts (he held an interest in land), and expenses for boots, vests, coats and hats.

While guardianship of a child lasted until the child came of legal age, or the money ran out, guardianship of an adult determined to be *Non compos mentis* (meaning "not of sound mind") would last until the court deemed the person competent, the money ran out, or the person died. For example, during the Civil War, case file no. 732 tells of John C. Hogan becoming the guardian for his grandmother, Mrs. Margaret Bailey, widow of Jonathan N. Bailey. When Hogan filed the initial petition, she resided in the home of her son-in-law, Thomas Brown. Hogan initiated his request because of an inheritance of approximately \$1,000 due Margaret from the estate of her brother, Hon. Judge Abeil Leonard of Howard County, Mo. The administrator of that estate declined to pay the money because of Margaret's "unsound mind." Margaret's guardianship lasted less than a year as her case file includes the undertaker bill for her funeral in Oct 1866 (Figure 7, page 6). It listed expenses for a satin lined casket, a cashmere shroud and cape, and a hearse and eight carriages.

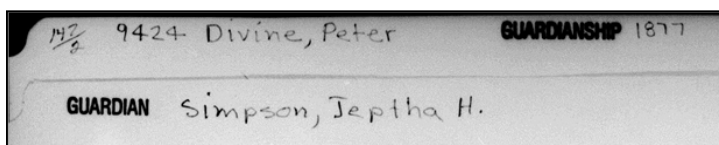


Figure 4 | Notations on an 1877 Case File Folder

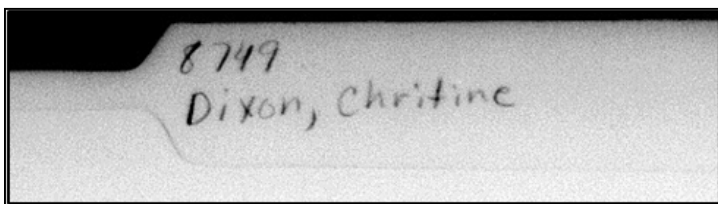


Figure 5 | Notation on a post-1876 St. Louis County case file folder found on the microfilm in alphabetical order by the name of the ward, Christine Dixon.

A case file can exist, even when a formal guardianship was never created. In 1903, Edward M. Taylor filed a document in St. Louis County Probate Court stating that Clara Taylor was of unsound mind and incapable of managing her affairs. An inquiry was called resulting in a jury trial. The October 1903 trial to determine her competency lasted three days and included testimony from a range of people, including bank personnel. The verdict found that Clara was competent and capable of handling her own affairs. What must have been an unpleasant experience for Clara also generated court related fees totaling \$222.00.

Acquiring copies of St. Louis City case files after 1901

Although the *index* for city guardianship case files goes up to 2006, the actual case files have only been filmed through 1901. If you find an index card for a guardianship case file in the City of St. Louis after 1901, you can obtain copies of the file documents in the file room of the St. Louis Probate Court Office, located on the 10th floor of the Civil Courts Building at 10 North Tucker Street in downtown St. Louis. Case file documents for St. Louis County guardianship cases through 1983 are available on microfilm held by the Special Collections Department.

Research tips

- More than one index card may exist for a single person, reflecting variations in name. Look to see if the cards list the same case number or different case numbers.
- A case file may contain only a single document in a case file folder, or it may be of sufficient length to fill several folders. When documents for a guardianship filled more than one folder, notations on the folders, such as 1 of 3, 2 of 5, etc., direct the user to the other folders. A case may

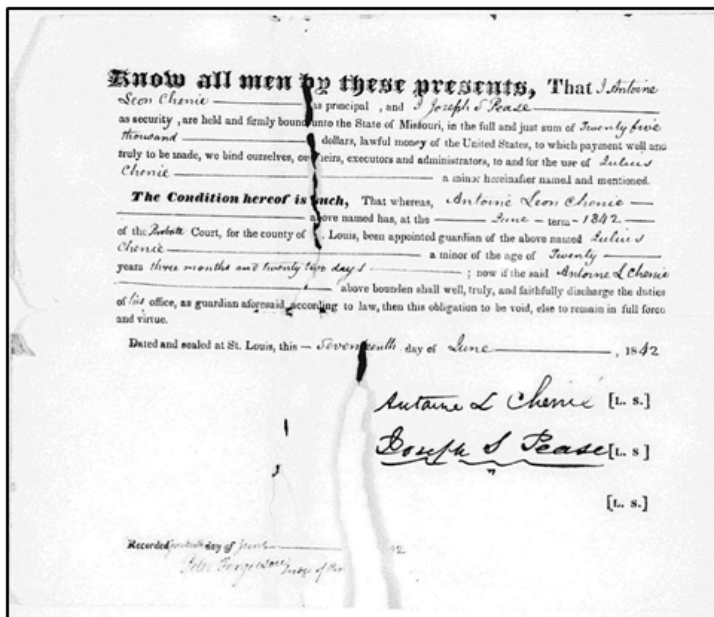


Figure 6 | June 1842 document showing Antoine Leon Chenie as guardian for Julius Chenie, aged twenty years, three months and twenty-two days.

also span more than one roll of film. If your case is the first or last file on the roll, check the roll before and after for possible additional documents.

- When the guardianship exists for a minor, the date when he or she will reach that legal age is vital. Because of that, the age of the child is often expressed in years, months, and days and the exact birth date may also be listed.

- When a guardianship exists for more than one child in a family, a notation, such as “See Folder/s # 9424, 9425, 9426, 9427,” directs you to connected folders. If your person of interest was the oldest child in the family who had a guardianship, follow the case file for each child. The file for the youngest child in the family might provide a further look into the family’s story long after the eldest child came of age.

- A child with a guardianship could have one or both parents still living. Such might be the case if a child inherited money or property from a grandparent or other person.

- When using a case file, note if there is a “frame number” between the top of the document image and the edge of the

film. Similar to a house number, it marks that document as unique within that film. Recording that frame number in your notes can save a great deal of time for you or anyone else who wants to view it again later.

Related Sources

Guardianship records can point to a possibly wide range of subsequent sources both backward and forward in time. Because guardianships were the function of the probate court, and often resulted from the death of a parent or grandparent, look for death-related records as a possible source of the money or property being preserved for the ward. Related records available in the Special Collections Department include obituaries probate files, death registers, cemetery listings, and funeral home and coroner’s records.

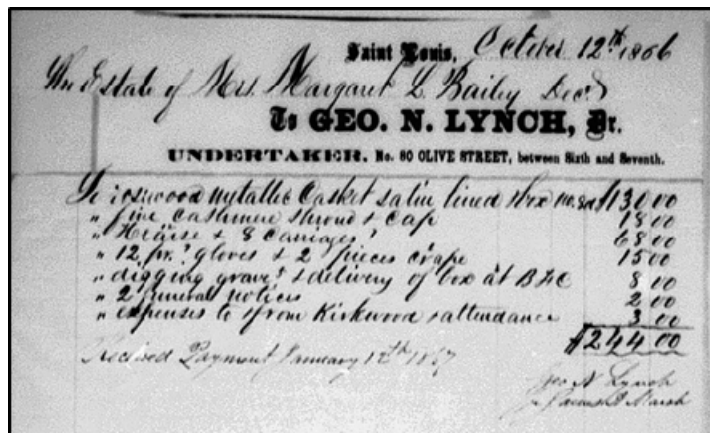


Figure 7 | 1866 funeral bill for Mrs. Margaret Bailey

Immanuel Lutheran Church marriages registered at Board of Health

If you have tried but failed to find a mid-19th-century St. Louis civil marriage record, the explanation might be found in Immanuel Lutheran Church records. Marriages records created from mid-1877 to 1881 by Immanuel's pastor, the Rev. J.F. Buenger, notes the acts as being recorded with the St. Louis Board of Health.

An investigation by a Special Collections Department staff member discovered that Immanuel marriages during this period are not found in the city's marriage indexes or registers. Why the marriages were recorded with the Board of Health and not the Register of Deeds (both offices were located at City Hall) is unknown. By mid-1881, the Board of Health notation ceases in Immanuel's records, and the marriages are once again found in the city's civil records. It is unknown if registering marriages with the Board of

Health was a common practice, but the discovery in Immanuel's records implies that other marriages might have been recorded there as well.

The marriages were recorded when Immanuel Church was located at 15th and Morgan (now Delmar) Streets. It had moved there in 1868 from 11th Street and Franklin Avenue, the location where it was first established in 1847. The congregation again relocated to Marcus and Lexington Avenues next to Western Lutheran Cemetery in 1920. Immanuel closed in 2012.

Maplewood “bone dry” law goes into effect tomorrow

Maplewood’s “bone dry” ordinance passed May 2nd by the Mayor Burks administration, designed to more closely restrict to the “straight and narrow” those who conduct soft drink stands will go into effect tomorrow.

The new ordinance calls for an “open front,” meaning that there must be no window or door curtains to obstruct an interior view from the outside. This is to make possible the reflection of any “moonshine” (if there be any) on the inside.

Another clause of the ordinance confines the “open hours” of the soft drink stands to the hours intervening between 7 o’clock in the morning and 11 o’clock at night.

The ordinance also provides that all offenses against the prohibition law will be tried in the courts of Maplewood, a privilege granted under a recent legislative enactment.

Chief of Police Caldwell has announced that the ordinance will be strictly enforced. Mayor Burks administration made several appointments to the departments he headed.

His ability as a police officer was well known to Chief of Police Madden, who recommended his appointment. As the police force had just been filled in Webster Groves by the appointment of three officers, it was necessary for the City Council to create the office of assistant chief so as to annex the services of Brown.

Will grow cotton on farm in county

Tract of Ground on the Olive Street Road Has Been Planted to Four Varieties.

Will St. Louis County farmers raise cotton in the future? An experiment is being made at the present time by vacuum Cotton Harvester Company of St. Louis, which has selected a tract of ground from L.H. Gleser on the Olive Street road just west of the Denny road where they have planted and will cultivate intensely four varieties of seed cotton—“Trice,” “King’s Early,” “Express” and “Wanamaker Cleveland.”

This has been done to see whether or not cotton can be raised to maturity commercially in this latitude and if successful to approximate the best varieties planted that can be grown this far north and the yield per acre of each. Care has been selected in the seed and in the manner of planting and no doubt our county farmers are going to watch the results with much interest. In this connection expert services and advise of the United States Department of Agriculture, the Department of Agriculture at the University of Missouri and several of the expert cotton planters were obtained.

It will also be watched with much interest by the cotton growers of the South on account of the magnitude of the experiment and also the freedom from boll weevil. Cotton has been grown successfully within 150 miles south of St. Louis County.

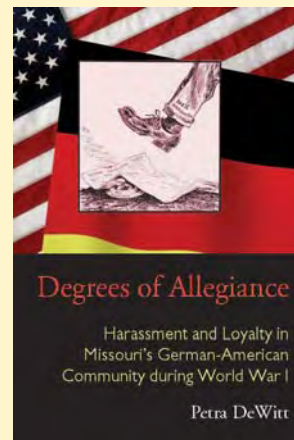
