Use *Footnote* database for free at St. Louis County Library

Footnote is now available in the Special Collections Department or at public computers at any St. Louis County Library branch. Besides access to primary sources from the National Archives and other repositories, *Footnote* has other features that make it a unique and valuable research tool.

One such feature is the database's social networking function. Users with a *Footnote* account can add valuable information through annotation, upload their own images, and find possible connections with other researchers. Users can also save images to their accounts for retrieval later. Establishing a user account is free and can be done from any computer with Internet access.

For Missouri researchers *Footnote* includes St. Louis city directories, 1863-1923 and Missouri Union and Confederate Civil War service records. Users can get a good overview of available record sets by clicking the "Site Map" link on the extreme bottom-right corner of the *Footnote* homepage. *Footnote* document images are very high quality and frequently clearer than microfilm.

When using *Footnote* for the first time at the library, it is helpful to read "Using *Footnote* at the St. Louis County Library." The page is linked from the *Footnote* homepage when accessed at a library computer.

Want to know more about using *Footnote*? The database has been added to the Special Collections Department's genealogical database classes. Although users can search *Footnote* at home for free, downloading and printing documents usually requires payment. Here's a tip: search at home, and then come to the library to print out your finds. Letter-size prints are just 10 cents each. 11" x 17" prints (available only in the Special Collections Department) are 20 cents each.

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Learn more! Workshops from Special Collections Department

The Special Collections Department is offering a series of workshops to help researchers sharpen their skills. While some workshops will offer an introduction to the Department and teach basic research skills, others will feature more advanced topics. Initial workshop offerings are listed below. The Department plans to add more workshop sessions and topics in the future.

Pre-registration required

Each workshop is free and open to the public but space is limited. Registration will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis beginning four weeks in advance of the workshop date. Workshop topics and dates

Genealogical Research: Getting the Most out of the Special Collections Department

■ **Thursday, July 16, 6:30 – 8:30 pm, Headquarters Auditorium**

This introductory course will have three main emphases:

- An overview of genealogical research, including how to get started, citing sources and organizing research findings.
- Basic library skills, including a discussion of the Dewey Decimal system, the online library catalog, resource formats (print, microform and electronic), and collection guides and finding aids
- An overview of resources available in the Special Collections Department.

This workshop is appropriate for beginning researcher and who have little or no previous experience. Registration is limited to 18 participants.

Learning How to Read and Write Township and Range Land Descriptions

This workshop will be offered on two dates:

■ **Saturday, July 25, 9:30 am – 11:30 pm, Headquarters Auditorium**

■ **Wednesday, July 29, 6:30 – 8:30 pm, Headquarters East Room**

The ability to read and understand land descriptions is essential for unlocking important information found in deeds, probate files, and court case documents in states using township and range property descriptions. Participants will learn:

- How to plat property on a township grid
- How to write a land description from a plat map

States using township and range descriptions are Alabama, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Ohio, Wisconsin, and all states west of the Mississippi except Texas and Hawaii.

Besides the presentation and hands-on activities, the class will include a brief tour of the Special Collections Department with emphasis on specialized resources needed for land research.

This workshop is designed for researchers who would like to advance their research skills. Knowledge of basic research skills and previous experience in doing genealogical or property research is recommended. Registration is limited to 12 participants per session.

Ancestral Timelines: Records for Researching Your Family History

This workshop will be offered on two dates:

■ **Saturday, August 22, 9:30 – 11:30 am, Headquarters Auditorium**

■ **Wednesday, August 26, 6:30 – 8:30 pm, Headquarters Auditorium**

New researchers or those wanting a refresher will find this workshop useful. The presenter will offer an overview of basic records used in genealogical research, including birth, marriage, death, immigration and naturalization, census, city directories and newspapers. The session will include lively discussion and hands-on activities. Participants should compile and bring with them existing genealogical information or documentation (please do not bring valuable originals).

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This workshop is appropriate for beginning researchers who have little or no previous experience. Registration is limited to 20 participants.

Researching orphans, orphanages, and adoption

FOR THE RECORDS The issues surrounding orphans can pose significant roadblocks to genealogical research. The growth of privacy laws and a change in philosophy away from institutional care in the 20th century makes such research even more difficult. The Special Collections Department has a number of resources to help researchers find information, create a research strategy, and learn the history of this complex subject.

Orphanage records

Many orphanages were founded in the 19th century by civil and religious institutions, and St. Louis was no exception. Orphanages were not only established to provide care for homeless, abandoned, and parentless children, they also took in children who had parents. Many of these were “half-orphans,” children whose one remaining parent could not provide care or support. Although institutions commonly sought to return their wards to the parental home, this was frequently not possible. Many children lived in the orphanage until reaching the age of majority. The Special Collections Department has records for several local institutions:

- *German General Protestant Orphans’ Home Intake Records, 1878-1943*. Microfilm. Located in Microfilm Drawer 2.

An index to these records is available at call no. R 977.866 I38. See below for a history of this institution.

- *St. Louis City Registrar Journal of Commitments to House of Refuge, 1854-1899* Microfilm. Located in Microfilm Drawer 2.

An index to this set was published in the *St. Louis Genealogical Society Quarterly*, Vol. 25, Nos. 3-4 (1992) and Vol. 26, Nos. 1-3 (1993), also available in the Department. Inquire at the Department’s reference desk.

- “St. Louis Orphanages in the 1900 Census.”

This index, located on the finding aids counter in the Special Collections Department, lists residents and employees at ten St. Louis institutions.

Histories, general and local

The Special Collections Department has a number of books for readers interested in the history of the subject:

- Cary, E. Wayne, ed. *Adoption in America: Historical Perspectives*. Ann Arbor, Mich.: University of Michigan Press, 2004. Call no. R 362.734 A239.

This collection of ten scholarly essays from various authors investigates specific historical aspects of adoption. Essays include “A Good Home: Indenture and Adoption in Nineteenth-Century Orphanages” by Susan L. Power, “Adoption Agencies and the Search for the Ideal Family, 1918 – 1965” by Brian Paul Gill, and “When in Doubt, Count: World War II as a Watershed in the History of Adoptions” by E Wayne Carp and Anna Leon-Guerron.

- Patrick, Michael D. and Evelyn Goodrich Trickel. *Orphan Trains to Missouri*. Columbia, Mo.: University of Missouri Press, 1997. Call no. R 362.73 P314O and circulating copy.

In 1853, Charles Loring Brace founded the Children’s Aid Society in New York to provide homes for children living on the street. The society’s inability to provide for so many children led Brace to devise a program of sending orphans west to live with farm families. This book recalls the history of these “orphan trains” in Missouri and tells the experience of some of the orphans who lived with foster families in the state.

The Department is fortunate to have several histories relating to local institutions. Their individual stories illustrate how the services of orphanages established in the 19th changed radically during the course of the 20th.

Now known as YouthBridge Campus, the German General Protestant Orphan’s Home was founded in 1877 and was related to two important St. Louis German Protestant congregations: the Independent German Evangelical Protestant Church of the Holy (CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE)

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Ghost Church (later known as Holy Ghost United Church of Christ) and the Independent German Evangelical Protestant Congregation (now Christ the King United Church of Christ in Florissant).

Founded at 2651 Morgan St. in 1886, the organization moved to its present campus in Bridgeton in 1906.

St. Vincent's Home was founded in 1849 and originally served the German Catholic community in response to the number of orphans left by a devastating cholera epidemic.

Research on living persons

The Department frequently receives inquiries from adoptees searching for birth family and vice-versa. Privacy laws and the policies of individual institutions can make this type of research extremely challenging. The Department has several published guides and other information for those interested in pursuing such research. Inquire at the Department's reference desk.

TIPS

- **When examining an image from a search result in *Ancestry***, look at the images that follow, also—they might include related information. In the case of a particular passport application search, for example, *Ancestry* returned only a single hit for a specific name. Clicking on the "view image" link led to an image within a group of several hundred others. Paging forward revealed three more consecutive documents related to the application. The last two images had no direct links to them but were more genealogically rich than the first, which was a cover letter.

- **Looking for a recent St. Louis obituary?** The *St. Louis*

Post-Dispatch is available electronically at St. Louis County Library. Though the database covers 1988 - present, obituaries are only available beginning Nov. 4, 1999. The database is available on the library's [database page](http://www.slcl.org/databases/newspapers.htm) <<http://www.slcl.org/databases/newspapers.htm>>. The database can be accessed at home with a valid St. Louis County Library card.

- **Are you from out of town or otherwise unable make it to the library this summer?** The Special Collections Department staff will do lookups and send the results by mail. Lookup possibilities include marriage and death records, church records, books, newspaper obituaries, and other published sources. The source must be indexed unless the request is specific enough for that staff to locate the information quickly.

Send lookup requests to sollections@slcl.org. There is a limit of three lookups per request. The cost is 25 cents per microfilm copy, 15 cents for 8-1/2" x 11" and 30 cents for 11" x 17" photocopies, plus a \$1 handling fee, payable by invoice sent with the lookup results. Please allow two weeks for a response to a lookup request.

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historic maps of the Tarheel State in this online collection from the University of North Carolina. Maps are drawn from the collections of the North Carolina State Archives, the North Carolina Collection at UNC-Chapel Hill, and the Outer Banks History Center. The project, when completed, will offer access to more than 1,500 maps, ranging from the late 1500s to the 1970s and include detailed maps for each county in the state.

New on the web

■ [Familysearch.org](http://familysearch.org) <<http://familysearch.org>> continues to add more digitized records to its website. A news release from July 17 reports that the Louisiana and Idaho death records are now available, and Delaware, the District of Columbia, Michigan, Nevada, New Hampshire, and New Mexico were added to the 1920 U.S. Census collection.

New on Ancestry

■ **1861, 1871, and 1881 Census of Canada:** The 1861 census, taken before Canada was independent, only includes schedules for New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Prince Edward Island and Quebec, although some provinces only recorded the heads of household. All Canadian census databases include original images and an every-name index (except as noted for the 1871 census).

■ **NARA Collections Database:** This database serves as the catalog of all the National Archives (NARA) collections available on *Ancestry*. The collection is searchable by series number (e.g., T288 or M262), NARA title or *Ancestry* title. The database can also be browsed.

■ **Official Army Register of the Volunteer Force of the United States Army, 1861-1865, Parts 1-8:** Published in 1865, this register contains listings for all Union Civil War regiments, including the dates of regiment formation and dissolution with lists the officers. In many cases entries also list the battles in which a regiment honorable served.

Ancestry continues to add titles to the German and Canadian Collections, as well as update existing databases regularly. Check often for recent additions.
