As was mentioned in Part 1, most of the Department's holdings are classified in the 900s, because they deal with history, geography, or biography. The Department does, however, have a limited selection of items in the lower call number ranges. The Department's items pertaining generally to religion (200s) are worth mentioning, as they include general denominational histories and directories. The majority of items below 900 fall in the 300s, the Social Sciences. In Political Science (330s) are volumes of the American State Papers and index to the U.S. Serial Set. Materials produced by the Daughters of the American Revolution and similar associations are shelved in the 360s (Social Services: Associations). Foreign-language dictionaries are shelved in the 400s (Language).

Math and Science, Medicine and Technology, Arts and Recreation, and Literature, covering call numbers from the 500s through the 800s, are thinly represented in the Department. Even here, however, are some gems. Note the following examples:

610s—Medical Science: Charles E. Rosenberg. The *Cholera Years: The United States in 1832, 1849, and 1866.* Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1987. R 614.514 R813C

720s—Architecture: Dreck Spurlock Wilson, ed. *African American Architects: A Biographical Dictionary, 1865 – 1945.* New York: Routledge, 2004. R 720.92 A258

790s—Recreational and Performing Arts: Bob Bailey. *Baseball Burial Sites*. Haworth, N.J.: St. Johann Press, 2004. R 796.357 B154B

800s—Literature and Rhetoric: The Department has a number of books about writing and publishing family histories.

Then begins the bulk of the Department's collection covering History, Geography and Biography, proceeding, as does every Dewey classification, from the general to the specific. The 929 range covers genealogy specifically. The Department's extensive collection of guides, handbooks

and "how-to" books are in 929.1. Published family histories are in 929.2. Since holdings in this classification alone would fill the entire department, they are shelved on another level in the closed stacks and may be requested at the Reference Desk. Printed immigration indexes are shelved in 929.3 and name dictionaries at 929.4.

Books dealing with European genealogy and history are classified in the 940s. As with the arrangement of materials within the United States, items are arranged geographically beginning with the British Isles (941s) and proceeding through various countries and regions: 942—England and Wales; 943—Central Europe and Germany; 944—France; 945—Italy; 946—Spain and Portugal; 947—Eastern Europe; 948—Scandinavia; and 949—all others in Europe.

In the Special Collections Department, some call numbers are preceded by the letter "R." This indicates that the book is "reference use only" and cannot be checked out. If a call number is preceded by "Q," it is a "quarto," meaning it is taller than 9-1/4 inches.

In addition to family histories, other groups of cataloged materials are shelved separately. Periodicals, except for those relating to Missouri and Illinois, are shelved on in the closed stacks. CDs are located at the Reference Desk. Maps are stored in map files in the Department.

The Department's book shelves are labeled to help guide you to items in various call number ranges. As always, the Special Collections Staff is on hand to help you find the items you need and can help you navigate the Dewey Decimal Classification System.

LOST AND FOUND

A Special Collections Department patron, new to genealogy, wanted to find the village in Europe where his ancestor was born. He brought with him a printout that referenced a man he believed was his ancestor, but he was not sure. The entry, printed from an *Ancestry* database index, came from *The Alsace Emigration Book* (three vols., Call no. 944. 383 S377A and R 944.383 S377A), a well-known source that includes 18th and 19th century immigrants to America.

Often, a database does not contain as much information as the source from which it came, so a librarian and the patron pulled the book to look at the original entry. The book

included one important piece of information that the *Ancestry* index entry did not – the name of his ancestor's village! The header at the top of that column identified the information as "birthplace."

Although he was excited by this find, the patron was even more excited when he came back to the desk a bit later. The book listed the emigrants in alphabetical order, and so browsing was easy. There on the same page were his ancestor's parents and grandparents – all born in the same village!

Organize your memories for writing and sharing

The holidays will arrive soon, bringing family gatherings and fresh opportunities to share personal memories and family history. The Special Collections Department has a number of helpful books for those who would like to take a more formal and organized approach to sharing these stories.

In Family Focused: A Step-by-Step Guide to Writing Your Autobiography and Family History (Janice T. Dixon, Wendover, Neb.: Mount Olympus Publishing, 1997; 929 D621F), the author begins by discussing how to organize information and begin thinking about life events with the goal of creating a personal written narrative. Additional chapters cover writing style and techniques to make stories vivid and engaging. Other sections of the book cover the basics of family history research, the use and care of photographs, writing diaries and personal letters, and information for publishing personal and family histories. An appendix includes a list of "memory joggers" to help the writer get started.

While Family Focused is full of concrete "how-to" information, Linda Spence's Legacy: A Step-by-Step Guide to Writing Personal History (Athens, Ohio: Swallow Press / Ohio University Press, 1997; 808.066 S744L) is designed primarily as an aid to recovering the memories and feelings that are the raw materials for writing a personal narrative. Introductory material focuses on the importance and discipline of writing. Chapters cover various periods of life and encourage writers to meditate on their lives through open-ended questions. Although

designed for writers, this book would also provide interesting "story-starters" to get relatives sharing their memories around the holiday dinner table.

Writing a personal history can be challenging and motivation is the key. But what about those relatives—often elderly—whose life stories should be told, but who have neither the motivation nor perhaps the ability to do so? Oral history provides a solution. *Oral History for the Family Historian: A Basic Guide* (Carlisle, Penna.: The Oral History Association, 2006; 907.2 B2620), by Linda Barnickel, provides comprehensive advice for conducting oral interviews and preserving the results. Introductory material discusses the purpose of oral history, its value for genealogy, and its broader importance for history and cultural memory. The author includes information about copyright issues and obtaining legal permissions. Appendices include potential discussion points for conducting an interview and a project checklist.

- At the end of the 1905 East St. Louis city directory, there is a 186-page booklet entitled East St. Louis: A Short History Together with Interesting Data, Biographies, Write-ups, Pictures and General Information. Topics in it include:
 - "East St. Louis Yesterday and Today: Its Growth and Prospects," including information on East St.

Louis businesses and businessmen (many photos), water and rail transportation, schools and libraries

- Photographs of the graduates of East St. Louis High School for the class of 1904.
- Photos for the movers and shakers of the day, including politicians, lawyers and educators, among others.
- A list of interesting facts about East St. Louis
- A multi-page timeline for East St. Louis from 1765 to 1903
- Two messages from Mayor Silas Cook
- A history of the National Stock Yards

The 1876 Kansas City directory includes a 136-page illustrated catalogue from Abernathy, North & Orrison of Kansas City, Missouri. The full title is "Illustrated Catalogue and Price List of Chairs, Chamber Sets, Parlor Suits [sic], Children's Charriages [sic], Window Fixtures, Carpets, Oil Cloths, Matting, etc., and Everything Connected with the Furniture and Carpet Trade. Also Coffins and Coffin Trimmings."

Microfilm for the 1905 East St. Louis and 1876 Kansas City directories are available in the Special Collections Department.

■ When using the new Family Search (LDS) Pilot Site to search for digital records, be sure to try the "More" link in the lower left-hand corner of the search template. This allows users to add the names of a spouse and parents to the search. Users can also search only using only one parent's name. This is helpful in searching for birth or death records, especially if you are not sure of the person's married name, or if you are uncertain that you have located all of the children. New on Ancestry Library Edition

Ancestry Library Edition is available at all St. Louis County Library locations.

■ New French databases:

Paris, France and Vicinity Births, 1700-1899 Paris, France and Vicinity Marriages, 1710-1907 Paris, France and Vicinity Deaths, 1707-1907: Paris, France and Vicinity Marriage Banns, 1860-1902

All four databases feature basic information extracted from original records and recorded on index cards in French.

- UK Incoming Passenger Lists, 1878-1960: This database, covering the years 1878-1888 and 1890-1960, indexes passenger lists of ships arriving in the United Kingdom from foreign ports. Includes links to high-quality images.
- U.S. Compiled Revolutionary War Military Service Records, 1775-1783: A database derived from National Archives Microfilm no. M880 (Navy) and M881 (Army). Records are arranged by regiment. Although the database is not indexed by name, it can be browsed by state, regiment and company. The images are exceptionally clear and easy to read.
